

THE GREAT COMMANDMENTS

The central theme of today's readings is the greatest commandment in the Bible, namely to love God and express that love in action by loving Him living in our neighbor.

The first reading from Exodus explains the second greatest commandment, namely, loving one's neighbors, especially the underprivileged. The chosen people of Israel should remember that once they were aliens in the land of Egypt. Just as God protected them and treated them kindly, so they are to protect others and treat them with kindness. Thus, they should become a humane society rooted in the basic religious concept of loving God living in their neighbor.

In the second reading, St. Paul congratulates the Thessalonians on the positive effects of their example of loving one another as Jesus had commanded them to do. Their mutual love and their loving reception of Paul and response to his preaching bolstered the faith of Christians elsewhere who heard about them.

In the Gospel today, Jesus combines the commandment to love God with the commandment to love one's neighbor, and gives the result as one commandment of supreme importance in Christian life. Jesus underlines the principle that we are to love our neighbor as we love ourselves, because as God's children both of us bear God's image, and to honor God's image is to honor Him. Love for our neighbor is a matter, not of feelings, but of deeds by which we share with others the unmerited love that God lavishes on us.

Loving God with all our heart, soul, mind and strength, means that we should place God's will ahead of ours, seek the Lord's will in all things and make it paramount in our lives. There are several means by which we can express our love for God and our gratitude to Him for His blessings, acknowledging our total dependence on Him. We must keep God's Commandments, and offer daily prayers of thanksgiving, praise

and petition. We also need to read and meditate on His word in the Bible, and accept His invitation to join Him in the Mass and other liturgical functions.

God's will is that we should love everyone, seeing Him in our neighbor. Since every human being is the child of God and the dwelling place of the Spirit of God, we are actually giving expression to our love of God by loving our neighbor as Jesus loves him or her. This means we need to help, support, encourage, forgive, and pray for everyone without discrimination based on color, race, religion, gender, age, wealth or social status. Forgiveness, too, is vital. We love others by refusing to hold a grudge for a wrong done to us. Even a rebuke can be an act of love, if it is done with the right heart. We also express love through encouragement and by helping others to grow. We express *agápe* love in meeting the needs of others by using the talents and blessings that God has given us, by comforting each other, by teaching each other and by sharing the Gospel, in deeds and in words.

FAMILY-TO-FAMILY (F2F) UPDATE: SPOTLIGHT ON THE AHMADI FAMILY

The Ahmadi family, St. Bonaventure's sponsored refugee family, continues to make great strides in adapting to life in Northern California. Najib has a good position working security at a large office building in San Francisco, and Zainab is expecting a baby in February! The family was over the moon when they learned that the baby is a girl. Over the summer, the family moved to a safer apartment closer to the parish, and all three children (Fisal, age 15, Marwa, age 12, and Bilal, age 5) are attending new schools in Concord, where they are doing well. Zainab is attending English classes three evenings a week, and she continues to make great strides in gaining confidence and independence. She is looking forward to learning to drive!

A small group of dedicated F2F volunteers continues to guide and support the family. The volunteers provide friendship, financial counseling, and English tutoring as well as help in navigating the complex web of city, county, state and federal departments, agencies, laws and regulations that are a part of our everyday life. Currently, one of the challenges the Ahmadi family faces relates to transportation. With Najib working long hours in the City and Zainab unable to drive, the family needs help getting to and from school, medical appointments, and the Food Pantry.



HOW YOU CAN HELP!

As we all know, many hands make light work! Please consider helping the Family-to-Family volunteers drive five-year-old Bilal to and from school. He and his mother currently spend more than three hours each day walking and riding the bus so that Bilal can attend kindergarten. Zainab's obstetrician has recommended that she limit time on her feet--so as her pregnancy progresses and we move into winter, their commute will become increasingly difficult. The family also needs help with transportation to medical appointments and to our Tuesday Food Pantry. The Ahmadis are so very appreciative of all the support they have received from the St. Bonaventure community. Won't you help us as we continue to "welcome the stranger" as scripture and Church teaching instructs?

NEWS FROM OUR ST VINCENT DE PAUL CONFERENCE:

Thank you in advance for your generosity the weekend of October 28-29 when a second collection for our work will be offered. 

OCTOBER IS RESPECT LIFE MONTH: FAQ ARTICLE ON IMMIGRATION – WHERE DOES THE CHURCH STAND?

There is no question that our nation is experiencing an immigration crisis in multiple ways: growth in the number of undocumented persons, and growth in the many ways in which these immigrants do not receive fundamental respect for their rights and human dignity, especially those who perform hard work in vital industries. Our Church recognizes that the US immigration system is broken and has called for reforms. These include addressing root causes of migration, such as poverty; creating earned legalization and temporary worker programs; and restoring constitutional due process for immigrants. Many have questions regarding such reforms. Following are a few brief answers (further details are available on the USCCB website).



Do the U.S. bishops support any particular legislation to repair our broken immigration system?

Yes. In 2005 the bishops supported the Secure America and Orderly Immigration Act of 2005, introduced by Senator John McCain (R-AZ) and Senator Edward M. Kennedy (D-MA) in the U.S. Senate and Representatives Jim Kolbe (R-AZ), Jeff Flake (R-AZ), and Luis Gutierrez in the House of Representatives. The legislation includes many of the elements outlined by the U.S. bishops.

Do the U.S. bishops oppose any immigration legislation which has been introduced in Congress?

Yes. The U.S. bishops strongly oppose H.R. 4437, the Border Protection, Anti-Terrorism, and Illegal Immigration Protection Act of 2005, introduced by Representative James Sensenbrenner (R-WI) and Representative Peter King (R-NY). The legislation includes many harsh provisions which would bring undue harm to immigrants and their families, including mandatory detention of children.



Why is the Catholic Church involved in the immigration issue?

Several reasons: the Scriptures as well as Catholic social teaching, form the basis of the Church position. In Matthew, Jesus calls upon us to “welcome the stranger,” for “what you do to the least of my brethren, you do unto me” (Mt 25:35-40). The Church is also involved in the issue because many of the Catholic faithful are immigrants who need the support and assistance of the Church. Finally, the U.S. bishops believe that our current immigration system contributes to the human suffering of migrants and they have a duty to point out the moral consequences of a broken system.

Does the Catholic Church believe in “open borders?”

No, Church teaching supports the right of sovereign nations to control their borders. Enforcement of our borders, however, should include the protection of the basic human rights and dignity of the migrant and not place lives at risk.

Does the Catholic Church support illegal immigration?

No. The Catholic Church does not support or encourage illegal immigration because it is not good either for society (because of the presence of a large population living outside the legal structures) or the migrant (who is subjected to abuse, exploitation, and death in the desert). Instead, the Church is advocating changing a broken system so that undocumented persons can obtain legal status in our country and enter the United States legally to work and support their families.

Will a new legalization program simply lead to more illegal immigration?

No, not if the new program contains all the appropriate elements and is implemented properly. The creation of a temporary worker program with protections and more family reunification visas will help stem illegal immigration by providing legal avenues for migration. Moreover, the U.S. bishops have advocated for policies to address the root causes of migration, including sustainable economic development and fair trade and economic policies which take into account the plight of low-skilled workers. Only policies which address global economic inequities will provide the long-term solution to forced migration.

Is not an “earned legalization” another term for “amnesty”? Does not an “amnesty” reward illegal behavior and penalize those who are waiting in line legally?

No, an “earned legalization” is much different than an “amnesty.” An amnesty is a giveaway or forgiving of a debt. An “earned legalization” requires undocumented workers to “earn” permanent status by working over a six-year period before qualifying for legal status. It also requires the payment of a fine and English language capability. Thus, illegal behavior is not rewarded with a “free pass.” It is also important to streamline the family reunification system and other employment categories so that those waiting in line will receive legal status before those in the earned legalization program. Under this scenario, undocumented workers would not “jump the line” over those who have played by the rules.



LOS GRANDES MANDAMIENTOS

El tema central de las lecturas de hoy es el gran mandamiento en la Biblia, es decir, amar a Dios y expresar ese amor en acción amándolo a Él al amar a nuestro vecino.

La primera lectura del Éxodo explica el segundo mandamiento más importante, es amar a los vecinos especialmente a los más desamparados. El pueblo elegido de Israel debe recordar que antes eran extranjeros en la tierra de Egipto. Así como Dios los protegió y trató con amabilidad, ellos deben proteger a otros y tratarlos con amabilidad. “El que me ama cumplirá mi Palabra y mi Padre lo amaré y haremos en él nuestra morada, dice el Señor.” En este domingo encontramos un maravilloso mensaje en la Palabra de Dios para cada uno de nosotros como bautizados. El día de nuestro bautizo recibimos completamente la fuerza del Espíritu Santo y nos convertimos en verdaderos hijos e hijas de Dios. En el sacramento del bautismo Dios llena nuestro corazón del verdadero amor para que podamos amar a todos los que están a nuestro alrededor. Sin embargo, el mundo de hoy nos presenta un amor contrario al verdadero amor que nos presenta el Evangelio de hoy. El mundo de hoy nos presenta un amor temporal que no construye el reino de Dios. En el Evangelio de hoy, Jesús responde la pregunta ¿Cuál es el mandamiento más grande de la ley?
